

Africa looks to India for Healthcare Development at IHTC Conference

The 3rd Edition of the International Healthcare Tourism Congress 2018 (IHTC) was inaugurated in Bengaluru by Dr. Constantine Constantinides, Health Tourism Enterprise, Greece in the presence of Dr. Dan Christopher Namarika, Health Secretary, Ministry of Health - Lilongwe, Malawi, Dr. K.S Nayak, President GHTA (Global Healthcare Tourism association) and Dr. Gangadharan, Chairman Expert Committee IHTC.

The International Healthcare Tourism Congress (IHTC), returning to Bengaluru this March, hosts 200 influential Delegates who are from targeted countries like Kenya, Malawi, Mozambique, Ivory Coast, Ghana, Mongolia, Vietnam and many more.

Kenya Healthcare Delegation led By Mombasa State Health Minister to visit Mangalore for Long Term Collaboration right from training their healthcare professionals to advance treatment to their citizens. This strategic agreement would be the first international collaboration of Mangalore Hospitals with Mombasa. Healthcare tourism is set to be worth \$3,000,000,000 by 2025, according to a recent survey, and organisers of India's most comprehensive healthcare tourism event, feel that the country could be a world leader in the field.
